1. A middle aged alcoholic man who was living alone found dead at his house. He was lying on the ground facing up with injury to back of the head. You are asked to conduct postmortem examination on this case.

2. A young man found dead by the side of the road with injuries.

2.1.List the possible causes for his death.

2.2. If he was knocked by a motor car what are the injuries you expect in this case?

2.3.If there were firearm injuries to the head, how will you differentiate whether it is an entry wound or an exit wound (40 marks)

PART B

3. A 26 year old female presented to the Office of Judicial Medical Officer (JMO) with a history of assault by an acquaintance 2 days ago. She complained of abdominal pain and mild vaginal bleeding following a blow to her lower abdomen. As a part of the investigation, the assistant JMO explained the need to perform a vaginal and digital rectal examination. She consented but was obviously unhappy about it. She asked him if it could be done by a female doctor. The only female doctor in the unit was on leave at that time.

Because of the doctor's busy schedule he decided to go ahead with the examination despite the unavailability of a female chaperone. On the following day, the director of the hospital received a complaint from the patient's boyfriend accusing the assistant JMO of inappropriately touching the patient.

The SLMC also decided to initiate an inquiry into this incident on the grounds of alleged serious professional misconduct following a complaint received by them related to an improper and negligent examination.

- 3.2 Describe the administrative and ethical procedure to be followed in examining a female patient in a hospital ward/unit. (15 marks)
- 3.3 Discuss 'serious professional misconduct' and its application in this incident. (20 marks)
- 3.4 Describe the investigative mechanism followed by SLMC regarding the complaints received from public. (20 marks)
- 3.5 Describe how you would determine alleged negligence in this case. (15 marks)
- 3.6 Briefly state the legal provisions related to criminal medical negligence in Sri Lanka.

The Police have recovered a fresh dead body of a young, male person in an abandoned 4. house. The deceased appears to be emaciated and having poor personal hygiene. There was a firmly held 2 mL syringe in his right hand. A small empty bottle and partially burnt cigarette buds were found at the scene.
